Town considers garbage options

The Belle Plaine Town Board will look into ways to expand house-to-house garbage pickup while retaining the Recycling and Collection Center and saving money.

The town is preparing proposals for three interested providers. Chairman Alvin Bartz said the providers will be contacted to present their plans at the July 11 Town Board meeting with contracts likely issued at the August meeting.

Rite-Size Rolloff, which has since been acquired by Veolia Environmental Services, provides house-to-house pickup at 361 residences north and west of Highway 22 and Wisconsin Avenue. The town also operates the Recycling Center, which is open two or three days a week for citizens' dropoff. Waste Management hauls that garbage and recyclables.

Cost of disposal was more than \$150,000 in 2010, with about \$50,000 for Veolia, \$65,000 for Waste Management, \$37,000 for Shawano Landfill, plus town workers' wages. The town received \$9,900 in state recycling aid last year.

Veolia's contract expires at the end of 2011. Bartz said the town would like to give the house-to-house pickup option to all town residences plus keeping the Recycling Center open for those who prefer it. Another option would be to have pickup of larger bins by automated trucks.

Veolia, Waste Management and Harter's Fox Valley Disposal from Wittenberg are expected to compete for the contract. Harter's serves 19 municipalities in Shawano County.

Long Lake treats milfoil, sets annual meeting date

The **milfoil application** was scheduled to be completed the week of June 5, weather permitting. Keep an eve out on your piers for the notice that it has been done. This notice will also contain the information regarding how long to not use the lake water for watering your lawn/plants. We have switched applicators to Lake and Pond Solutions. This is the same applicator used fundraiser. We would like to thank everyone who made donaby the Cloverleaf Lakes. They have had success in treating their Milfoil problem when Long Lake has not. We are anticipating seeing some good results. Long Lake Board of Directors met with the applicator as to what else residents could do to help in the process. The one major issue that was reiterated was no raking, even after the treatment. Each time any fragment is broken off this nuisance of a weed, it will regenerate a new plant. Please only hand pull the weeds.

No Wake times will be shown by flags (bright orange) on specific piers, one in the middle section of the lake, and one on Weiner's pier (south/east end of lake/point). There is a reflector affixed to a retaining wall in front of Pringnitz's home (west end of lake) that is visual from the lake. If this reflector is submerged, that marks high water and the flags will then be posted. To reference the high water, it is set so that the lowest property will not be damaged by boat wakes. The lower edge was placed at the water mark from Memorial Day weekend. At that time, the water was just about to overtake the barrier of the lowest property.

All information will be reviewed at the annual Long Lake Property Owners meeting on Saturday, June 25, at 9:30 a.m.

This will again be held in the Lodge at Imago Dei Village (church camp). A pot luck lunch will follow. Everyone is encouraged to attend not only to hear the pertinent information and changes, but also to get together with your neighbors and meet some of our new neighbors. We hope to see you all there.

Long Lake just completed its second annual rummage sale tions and those who helped with the sale. There were many donations from our neighbors on the Cloverleaf Lakes and the town of Belle Plaine. Thank you to those who donated and visited the sale for your support. We raised another \$1,015 for the lake. With the ongoing cost of treating the milfoil, this fundraiser is crucial to assist with those costs.

Other notes of interest: As always, we are asking that any Northern Pike larger than $27\frac{1}{2}$ inches be released to keep the population growing. Know and follow all the boating rules. If you see someone who may not know the rules of the lake, please be courteous, but let them know what they are. We must also follow DNR regulations. No person should be riding on the bow of the boat (unless manufacturer seating is present) while under power. This may be fun, but can have devastating consequences if they fall overboard (even with a small wave). Remember the new no wake regulation: no wake within 100 feet of any shoreline. It is still 100 feet from any pier or raft for boats, 200 feet for personal watercraft. We are still looking for a volunteer for the secchi disk readings. Please contact a board member or volunteer at the annual meeting if you are interested.



"It's time consuming," Debbie said. "I can't just whip them out." She acknowledged it can be tedious work, but she has a lot of patience.

Beading requires a lot of calculations figuring how many beads will be in the width and length of each item depending of the size of the beads.

"To me it's very therapeutic," Debbie said. In the early '90s, Deb-

bie got into antiques, beaded and mesh purses in particular. She bought and repaired them. Then she wondered how they were made.

Debbie went online for information. She started with bead crocheting but didn't like it. She got a beading loom for Christmas in 2007 and began making colorful glass beaded purses.

"I made my first purse in 2008," Debbie said. "I've refined my process since I started."

When she wanted to make wine bags, her loom was too little so her husband, Greg, a retired commercial construction carpenter, built one for her.

"I am trying to get an inventory built up," Debbie said.

Her business, Maggie E, is named after her grandmother, Margaret Edith.

Most of her customers are by word of mouth, but Debbie is planning on expanding her online shop.

Each item can take 40 or more hours to make. "It's labor intensive as far as time," she said.

The beads are Czech seed beads or Japanese seed beads. There are thousands of beads in different colors and shapes with a wine bag needing 8,600 beads and wristlets taking 5,000 to 6.000.

The cost of each item varies. Coin purses are \$12.50 and up, wine bottle covers are from \$45 to \$140, and a sterling silver purse is \$300.

For ideas Debbie looks at vintage purses along with a 1924 book of old purse patterns.

"I enjoy being able to have an idea and make it come out in an item or product," she said.

Debbie works full time at the printing department at the Shawano County Courthouse. Right now beading is more of a hobby until she retires. Then she can bead to her heart's content at her home at W8162 Valley Lane in the town of Belle Plaine that she and her husband designed and built five years ago.
